## The Branches of Government

- Draw a diagram of the three branches of government (Executive, Legislative, and Judicial) illustrating how they work together. How do the branches balance one another?
- Find a group and play "Tri-Corners!"
  - Print and cut out <u>these cards</u>, and label three corners of the room as the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial branches of government.
  - Have one person read one card out loud. Everyone else should go to the corner that aligns with the job written on the card. A few people should discuss why they think the job belongs to the branch they chose, and then reveal the answer.
  - Repeat with the rest of the cards!



### Mr. President

- Pretend that you are president for the day. Write a persuasive paragraph (or draw out) your ideas on how you would make your classroom, school, or town a better place.
- Watch a video from Martha Washington as First Lady and think about the stories she is telling. Then, write her a short letter with your thoughts, observations, and questions.
- Create a list of predictions for why George
  Washington didn't want to be king. Next, while
  watching this video, listen for and write down
  at least 3 actual reasons why not. Were any of
  your predictions correct?

#### **Decision Making**

Play a game of "Would You Rather?" with friends with the following questions:

- Would you rather choose a cabinet(which is a team of advisors) or make all the decisions yourself?
- Would you rather fight in a war with another country or try to stay neutral?
- Would you rather create new taxes or find another way to raise money for the government?

## **The Constitution**
